SADATERU Oshigata

Editor's note: Mr. Pepper, who is affiliated with the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto, has offered to send us oshigata on occassion of some of the more interesting blades in the museum collection. The following is the first of many, we hope - a fine presentation!

TRANSLATION OF MEI: (free translation)

Omote: At Takafu in KITA-ETSU (North Etsu) a resident of

Akita in Ushu (Dewa Province), SADATERU.

Ura: a) Forged from iron ore produced in Unshu (Izumo Province) in the south, to the order of NAKAMURA

HIROSHI.

b) Twelfth year of Bunkwa, Twelfth month, Twelfth day.



PARTICULARS ON THE BLADE: (see following record sheet)

REMARKS:

So far, I have been unable to locate Mr. Nakamura, although he must have been a fairly significant person for the swordsmith to have (presumably) travelled all the way to Shinano from Dewa to forge a sword for him. It is possible that Mr. Nakamura came from Izumo, and specifically requested the use of ore from his home province. As this is a commissioned piece, it is highly likely that the other unusual features of the blade owe their existence to Mr. Nakamura. The number twelve obviously had some very important meaning in this particular case, as must the unusual piercings in the nakago. The two holes surrounding the mekugi-ana combine with it to form a shape reminiscent of certain Buddhist gravestones. The kyotan (gourd) might relate to the mysterious Mr. Nakamura's family MON, or something that had personal significance to him only.

One final word concerning the place-names. To my knowledge, the village of Takafu still exists, although it may now be a suburb of Nagano City. KITA or north ETSU is a very ancient name, dating back to a time when there was one large area known as Etsu, probably combining several provinces. (The character ETSU is the same as the ECHI of Echigo, Echizen, Etchu.) Takafu is in the northern part of this ancient district.

LOCAL MEETING HELD (St. Louis) -

In light of the increased interest in swords and in society membership here in St. Louis, it was decided to hold a meeting of collectors to introduce new members and simply enjoy some swords for an evening. The meeting was held April 2nd at the home of the editor. Attending were: Neil Keen, Howard Sloan, Jack Landis, Clarence Siman, Ron Hartmann, and Paul Maruyama. Dr. Hoopes was invited but was unable to attend.

Since this was an informal meeting with no real direction to be followed, it was spent going over the various treasures which everyone had brought along for conversation. Several 'new finds' were examined including a very well-forged diato with a 41 inch cutting edge recently found by Howard Sloan, and a very interesting Yokoyama school blade signed SUKENAGA with kiku mon and 'ichi' on nakago - a new find of Neil Keens. Other blades of interest were Jack Landis' super (Ho) NORIMITSU (displayed in Meibutsu Room - TKK'72), and his Chikuzen SHIGEKANE (to be featured in a future NL). The editor's collection was available and the main feature being the YAMON NAOKATSU tachi (Newport Beach Meibutsu exhibit 1974), followed by a Hizen YUKIHIRO I tachi and a 'possible' Bizen MORIMITSU tachi.

A good time was had by all and our thirst for a little sword-talk was quenched by handling and examining the items at hand. Mention of this meeting is made here at this time in the hope of encouraging more such gatherings in other areas - with reports given in the NEWSLETTER for all to enjoy.

Another such meeting was held several weeks earlier in Lincoln, Nebraska. Attending this affair was Peter Bleed, Ron Palmer, and Clarence Siman (who had driven up from St. Louis). Most of the time was spent discussing flaws (kizu) in blades - a most important thing to become familiar with and to understand.
