SOCIETY QUESTIONNAIRE REPORT -

The Questionnaire which was sent out to the membership along with the November-December NEWSLETTER received about a 60% response. The answers and comments will prove very helpful to the officers of your society in planning our direction in the future. The following is a brief report on the answers and comments compiled from these questionnaire.

An almost unanimous support for a society show reflects the memberships desire for us to sponsor some sort of regular activity. As for 1976 being a good year for a show, only 60% favored an event with the remaining 40% stating that 1976 had enough events already planned. Cities favored for our shows ranked St.Louis first, then Chicago, San Francisco, Boston, Dallas, Los Angeles, N.Y., and a few singles, Philadelphia, Atlanta and Washington D.C. being suggested.

It should be mentioned at this time that we will continue to take an active part in the annual Token Study Group show in Chicago rather than double-up efforts in that locality. Our association with the TSG is excellent and they have expressed a desire that we continue to coordinate some activities with their annual affair.

Some 35 people expressed a desire for a St. Louis show this year, a significant number to warrant plans for such an event.



REPORT (cont'd.) -

The idea of a sword/fitting CLINIC was overwhelming accepted. Interests ranked in Koto Blades and Iron Tsuba first. A prime consideration to be remembered in planning such a venture is finding a qualified SENSAI and the setting down of strict ground rules for handling items exhibited. It was obvious from comments made by our more experienced remeas that security against damage is a real problem. It is felt that this problem can be resolved and more on this program can be expected in a future announcement as plans develop.

Several people offered services in the translating area and they will be contacted as the need arises.

Many people offered items from their collections to be used in our Clinic Project but stipulations on security again would need to be made.

Thanks to all the members who took the time to answer this flyer. Our go-ahead on a St. Louis show is a first result of this report investigation into a Clinic also being formulated. It should be need that our questionnaire was not sent to our extreemly distant members because of their inaccessability to the programs mentioned. All succ programs will be reported on in detail so that everyone can benefic from them even if they are unable to attend personally.

ST. LOUIS JSS/US SHOW -

The society will hold a sword show in St. Louis the weekend of June 5Th/6Th of 1976, in conjunction with the estimated 500 table Missouri Arms Collector Association (MACA) Gun Show as proposed earlier. The show will be held at the SHOW CENTER, 9785 St. Charles Rock Road (approximately $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from our airport) and will be on the order of the Baltimore show in as much as we will be one segment of a large gun show. The MACA will sponser the event and we will be participants.

It will be a closed show and security will be good. JSS/US tables will be located in a specific area although the entire show will be open to everyone attending. Hotel/Motel accomodations and other sucn pertinent information will be presented in a flyer at a later date. All inquiries are to be directed to Clarence Siman since he will be our liaison between JSS and MACA.Clarence is also in charge of security for MACA.

Due to an unavoidable conflict of obligations, your editor will not be able to participate in any activities until Sunday, however, someone will be available at all times to represent the society and to give a hand if any problems arise. It promises to be a good show and no doubt will prove a good chance to round up some fresh blades and fittings. Give the show your support - see you there!

STOLEN SWORD ALERT - (see page 5)


Two years ago, this very fine tachi became missing from a = -e-house in Boston while temporarily in storage. The owner, Mr. -= -- Mack has asked that the membership be alerted to this problem. The NBTHK also announced this alert in their -----No. 204, January 1974, you may recall.

The mounting is ITO-NO-MAKI Tachi with KIRI and KIKU mons. key detail to watch for is that the two sling bands (ASHI) have ______ one large KIRI mon close to the OBITORI, as many other tachi have ______ small mons here. The following drawing explains this: The blade is Bizen SUKENAGA, made in the Kemmu Era (c.1334). Blade length is 2 Shaku 4 Sun 6 Bu (74.5cm) and is in SUGUHA.

OSHIGATA OF OMI (no) KAMI TSUGUHIRA -

Our oshigata this issue is one done by John Clark, who is served a very fine reputation for his excellent oshigata. Since these served are in thereselves, works of art, they are intended to be mounted framed. We are experimenting this issue with reproducing these and if all goes well we can look forward to more such beautiful oshigata John in the future. This particular oshigata was made for the served owner, Mr. Jim Hitchcock of San Francisco, California. Credit is also directed to John Yumoto who helped John compile this information.

- DESCRIPTION: Katana (suriage) with only OMI (no) KAMI....remaining Length is 2.29 Shaku (69.4cm). The blade is in verexcellent polish and is mounted in shirazaya.
- EXPLAINATION: This blade has been awarded N.B.T.H.K. Green Papers and has been attributed to TSUGUHIRA. This smith was of Musashi Province and worked around 1684. He was a student of YASUSUGU III.

MISCELLANEOUS -


